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Our History

Victory College was established in 1980 at its present location on Old Maryborough Road, Gympie, and was the former site of the Gympie Cattle Yards.

It was originally known as the Gympie
Christian Academy and had humble
beginnings with 2 teachers, 2 teacher aides
and 36 students. The first classroom doubled
as the church for the Christian Outreach
Centre and was set up on a Monday and
packed up each Friday afternoon.

By 1982 the College numbers had grown steadily and an administrator and additional staff were employed. In 1995 the College changed their curriculum from ACE to the Queensland State Education curriculum incorporating a Biblical worldview.

Following this, an additional 5 acres were purchased and many of the buildings refurbished. A new science and home economics block was built along with an Early Childhood Centre, a manual arts workshop and an art studio.

In 1996 the College introduced a change of uniform along with a new College crest and logo. Then in 1999 the College was renamed to Victory College in recognition of the 'victory' Christ achieved.

2010 saw the completion of further building development including a new library, an international-size sports stadium and a language centre.

In 2011 Victory College became an early adopter of the Australian Curriculum from Prep to Year 10 in Maths, English and Science. This decision saw our College be at the forefront of educational change and showed our commitment to ensuring academic standards were continually raised.

2012 was an exciting year as mykindy at Victory was opened offering 24 students a kindergarten education in the year before Prep. We also saw the transformation of our Victory College logo to the one it is today and new Secondary College dress uniforms were introduced.

In 2013 we opened our state-of-the art Science Labs and in 2015 our new Equestrian Centre was completed.

And in September 2017 we opened our new Hospitality Centre that features a professional kitchen and a front of house cafe where parents, staff and senior students can purchase various hot and cold drinks prepared by our barista, as well as delicious treats baked on site by hospitality students.

A roof and additional stables were added to the Equestrian Centre in 2018. In addition, there were 4 new classrooms added to Secondary in 2020 and a new Arts Precinct was also built in 2021.

In early 2022 we completed the renovations and additions at mykindy with two full size classrooms and a new outdoor play area

There are future plans to build a gymnasium at the end of the sports stadium in 2023 to cater for mental health, exercise, and bodybuilding for our students. The gymnasium will also include extra change rooms and amenities. We are also looking at a new surface for the sports stadium.

Currently, we are negotiating for a third stream to be built on our newly acquired land for our upper primary, due to the demand. This is to be built in 2024 which is very exciting for families associated with Victory College. It will include our long-awaited swimming pool, sports oval, and covered basketball court.

Victory College was built from the church's vision to educate the whole person and teach them about the love of God. This has been true since its inception in 1980. God has provided all the facilities and resources each student uses to equip them for their future. I acknowledge and praise Him for his favour over Victory College.

Our alumni continue to achieve tremendous results after they leave Victory College, and I pray for our departing Year 12 students, wishing them all the very best in their future endeavours. Victory College is a great contributor to our community, and I commend and thank you for your support.

Head of Primary's Report

2023 has been a great year! The year always goes too quickly but we have packed a lot in. In primary, we have been busy learning but also enjoying all of our regular extracurricular activities of incursions, excursions and camps.

This year we have been preparing for version nine of the Australian Curriculum which we will be implementing for English and Mathematics in 2024. We are continuing to focus on SSP as our spelling approach, with Mrs Jody Martin moving into an SSP Support Teacher role earlier this year. In English, all year levels from Year 1 to 6 ran literacy intervention groups for one hour each week, with additional staff to work with students in the areas of reading, writing, spelling and handwriting. We are planning to run a similar program with Mathematics next year.

Primary students continued to excel in both sporting and musical pursuits. We had a number of upper primary students make both District and Wide Bay teams for a number of sports and we competed in both Rugby League and Rugby Union gala days. It's always so inspiring to watch the teams play and see examples of great sportsmanship on the field, like when a student was sure to score a try but passed it to a teammate instead. Lots of our primary students participated in the musical showcases held at the College and competed at the Gympie Eisteddfod. Mrs

Lisa Smilie started running dance as part of the Victory Arts program and many primary students have been participating.

This year, we started doing Friday Afternoon Activities in primary. Our Prep to Year 2 students participated on odd weeks and our Year 3 to 6 students participated on even weeks. Lower primary students were able to choose between activities like outdoor games, board games, art and dance; and our upper primary students participated in activities like rugby league, touch, basketball, ultimate frisbee, netball, art, craft, Pilates, board games, crocheting, chess and creative writing. We are excited to offer students this range of additional activities and we'll have even more opportunities organised for next year.

Camps are such a great experience for students and we are committed to offering camp experiences each year in primary from Year 3 to 6. This year, both Year 3 and 5 enjoyed adventure camps to Maranatha and Noosa North Shore, whereas Year 4 had a beach camp at Alexandra Headlands. The Year 6s once again flew down to Canberra in July to enjoy seeing famous Australian national capital landmarks. All year levels enjoyed both incursions and excursions to places which included: The Ginger Factory, Sea Life, the Queensland Zoo, Eumundi Markets, the Gympie Show, Roadcraft, PlayBack, Gympie Gold Mining and Historical Museum and many more.

We have continued to use a restorative behaviour management model which focuses on building, maintaining and restoring positive relationships. Following up behaviour is always a conversation with students around how they can restore a relationship which may have been affected by a behaviour choice. At Victory College, we believe in rewarding positive behaviour. We have continued to run our Merit Program to acknowledge students who demonstrate 'The Victory Way' of honour, service and excellence. We had a large proportion of the primary students reach either bronze, silver or gold to receive icy poles, books and Lego sets. Our gold and platinum students also had their excursion to the pool, with platinum also going to Pizza Hut again.

We continued our Fruit of the Spirit awards in Chapel with a weekly focus on one of the fruits which is introduced to the students in the primary assembly. Galatians 5:22-23 says, "But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. Against such things there is no law."

This year has been a big year of planning for our new upper primary. Due to growth in our Primary College, we are planning to build a new space for upper primary in 2024. This is an exciting opportunity for the primary to move to three streams and add additional facilities like an undercover basketball court, primary music room, primary tuckshop, another primary oval, and an upper primary playground.

Head of Middle College's Report

By walking through and overcoming the challenges of 2022, we have gained a greater appreciation for the part each of us plays in making Victory College great.

We have successfully improved and consolidated our learning programs, and have been given strategic vision and insight into how to introduce more innovation and further ideas to continually develop the academic experience and pastoral support for our student community for 2023 and beyond.

Our students have also continued to flourish this year despite the challenges of Terms 1 and 2, which is a testament to their resilience and strength as learners, and to the support and encouragement given to them by their teachers, parents, and caregivers. Our students leave Year 9 and come to Year 10, some with defined purpose and others still very young in their thinking. And then, in just a couple of short years we are sitting with them at

Year 12 Retreat discussing future plans and farewelling a group of young adults. It is an amazing transformation and it is such a blessing to be a part of this.

Recently I had a Year 12 boy state to me how keen he was to get back to school after the holidays as it had impacted him that this thing we call school was nearly over. Throughout every year we see our Year 12 students indulging in College activities with the realisation that these are their last bites of the apple and that this strange experience we call school would soon end. And, like caterpillars about to make cocoons, soon they would be living very different lives with completely different expectations upon them.

Lastly, I want to encourage our parents to continue to parent their children. There are very strange new pressures on parents in our modern society, however, the role of a parent has not changed. Proverbs 22:6 says, "Train up a child in the way he should go and when he is old he will not depart from it."

This is the challenge for all parents.








Strategic Focus Areas

Equine Studies & Certificate II Rural Operations

Year 7 and 8 Elective:

It was a wonderful year, where all Year 7 and 8 students rotated through the Equine Studies elective. Through this, they had the opportunity to learn about and interact with horses, which was, for some, their very first time doing so. This has been a valuable way for students to see if Equine Studies, or being involved with horses, is something they may like to explore in the future.

Whether or not horses are a student's area of interest, there are many benefits they gain from the opportunity to interact with the Equine study horses. This includes confidence, new skills, positive relationships, overcoming fears, and greater self-awareness.

Teaching students to understand the origin of the horse, instinctive behaviour, how to read their body language, communicate with, care for horses and practise safe handling techniques establishes a comprehensive foundation for further study.

Through the Equine Studies Year 7 and 8 program, students learn:

- · The nature of the horse in the wild
- Instinctive behaviours
- · Reading horse body language
- · Safety around horses
- · The impact of horses in human history
- Safe handling techniques around and when interacting with horses
- Grooming equipment and application of equipment when grooming horses
- Equipment used when handling and riding horses, and
- · Foundational riding skills for Year 8.

Years 9 and 10 Equine Studies:

Year 9 and 10 Equine Studies is a composite two-year subject. Students go deeper into the study of horses, covering a variety of topics. This year students went into great depth on the topics of:

- Horse management and husbandry practices/safe horse handling practices
- · Horse breeds
- · The equine industry
- · Horse identification and confirmation

There were additional practical skills they learned over the year, such as horse handling and groundwork, equine assisted learning and groundwork skills, foundational riding skills and bringing a horse back into work.

These topics were possible thanks to the generosity of local Equine industry professionals who visited our class as guest speakers throughout the year, for example equine nutritionist Hayley Elliott, and equine dentist and vet Dr Shane Ross from Gympie Veterinary Services.

Horses, as with all animals, were specially created by God. God's nature can be seen reflected in the horse's sensitivity, kindness and trusting nature, matched with their power, beauty and majestic presence. Horses are well known for their ability to enhance the lives of people and can be used to assist God in healing and restoration. We are blessed in our relationships with horses and thankful for the gift of them in our lives.

AHC21216 Certificate II in Rural Operations (Horse Husbandry Assistant):

In 2023, we had two Year 11 students and one Year 12 student undertake their Certificate II in Rural Operations (Horse Husbandry Assistant) as a subject at Victory College. Victory College offers this study in collaboration with the International Horse College for students interested in a career in the horse industry.

Equine industry trainer and assessor, Mrs Karen Eggleston, works in conjunction with the International Horse College to provide training, support and practical assessments on campus at Victory College, using the College Equine study horses and Equestrian facility. Victory College is looking forward to continuing to provide a range of industry-related training and qualifications to its **senior Equestrian students**.


Fashion & Design



Film, Television & News Media

This year, students delved into the world of multi-platform storytelling. Their first assessment was to conduct a case study of an Australian TV show and explore how they use a range of media platforms to engage with the audience. They were then required to make a short movie themselves that could be promoted as a series and developed across multiple platforms.

Matthew Cooley's mockumentary The Emu Wars detailed the unusual, but true, story of Australia's bizarre war with a bunch of emus that destroyed crops in Western Australia. Using archival footage and the heavily dramatic acting of Jayden Beamish, Matthew managed to tell the story of this unusual war with a healthy blend of special effects and humour. Ella Shepherd explored the awkward chemistry when friends part ways, while Samuel Pocock's movie Goobers was like the Australian version of Dumb and Dumber.

The unit for study in Semester 2 was called 'Identity'. Students were asked to explore their own inner world and try to express what they were feeling in a more lateral and abstract manner. It was amazing how similar the themes were among all our filmmakers. Most students mapped out movies and ideas based on the idea of procrastination, a loss of identity, and not really knowing what to do with their life. Lachlan Holt's use of an angry puppet created a very eerie ambience and Jett Chong's hooded masked figures created a macabre and ghostly aesthetic.

Matthew Cooley's last movie ever at Victory College was called Stuck, and it explored the idea of a person who, after leaving school, never fulfills any of his dreams and ends up returning to the same school to work as a janitor for the rest of his life. (We hope this

does not come true for Matthew!). This final piece for Matthew was both funny and also tragic. It was similar, in a way, to the theme explored in Groundhog Day.

From brainstorming ideas to viewing some of the classic movies (in particular Psycho by Alfred Hitchcock) and experimenting with visual and audio elements in post-production, students have creatively expressed their ideas and feelings through the magic and mystery of the media arts.






Response rate over time

In 2023, 84.6% of Year 12 completers from Victory College (Gympie) were engaged in education, training or employment in the year after they completed school.




Of the 39 respondents, 46.2% continued in education and training. The most common study destination was apprenticeship.




A further 38.5% transitioned directly into paid employment only.
